Attachment theory

Ainsworth

- Deep emotional connection that infant develops with primary caregiver
- Reflects an "internal working model" expressing the infant's expectations of parental behaviour in meaningful situations
- Basis for development of later relationships
- Increasingly recognised as determinant of later emotional, cognitive and social outcomes

- Physical/sexual/emotional abuse
- Neglect (physical/emotional)
- Domestic substance abuse

- Parental mental illness
- Parental criminality

Economic cost of child maltreatment

• "The total lifetime economic burden resulting from new cases of fatal and nonfatal child maltreatment in the United States in 2008 is approximately \$124 billion in 2010 dollars. This economic burden rivals the cost of other high profile public health problems, such as stroke and Type 2 diabetes (Fang et al., 2012)."

The Dunedin cohort

- 1000 children recruited in late 1972/3
- At age 3, "at risk" children identified on the basis of chaotic circumstances, emotional behaviour, negativity and poor attentiveness
- As adults, those "at risk" were more likely to :
 - be unemployed
 - have criminal convictions (especially for violence)
 - been pregnant as a teenager
 - have a substance abuse problem
 - exhibit signs of insulin resistance and metabolic syndrome

Why public policy fails

- •We tend to focus on people's problems, needs and deficiencies
- We design services to fill gaps and fix their problems
- Services are rarely designed to take account of complexity
- Citizens become passive, and, essentially, recipients of services
- We do things to people rather than with them.

Reduce Stillbirths and Infant Mortality

A reduction of 15% in the rates of stillbirths and infant mortality by 2015

85% of all children have all the developmental skills and abilities expected of a 27-30 month old by the end of 2016

90% of all children have all the developmental skills and abilities expected at the start of primary school by the end of 2017

EYC stretch aims – making Scotland the best place in the world to grow up! 90% of all children in each Community Planning Partnership area will have reached all of the expected developmental milestones and learning outcomes by the end of Primary 4, by end-2021
